2024

We are looking forward to 2024 for a number of reasons. On our return, the school grounds and classrooms were beautifully presented. We are approaching the last of the jobs in the Middle School.

Significant painting was undertaken in the Primary School with many of the Primary classes having significant upgrades, (one has even gone from a Tech room to a brand new classroom), the students in Years 4 & 7 have received their new laptops whilst all other students have been allocated their new devices (albeit with some minor IT glitches). The staff have spent many days preparing their classrooms and also on learning/wellbeing programs (sincere thanks for the work that you do and have done). The P&F have purchased new outdoor settings for the JP area, work has been undertaken to commence transforming the block at 21 Victoria Road into a facility that will further support our Agriculture program, and we continue to work on our plans to transfer St Michael's Hall into a Tech/Maker Space and Performing Arts Centre which will also include instrumental learning spaces, uniform shop & Parish facilities.

Towards the beginning of 2024, we will revisit our School Strategic Plan - 2024-2026 which provides us with the guidance/vision/plan to shape the future direction of the school. We will also undertake the process of advertising for a new principal (I come to the end of my second tenure in 2024 and whilst I have loved the past 21 years it will be someone else's role to lead the school in 2025).

We are also looking at the possibility of further expanding our leadership team in 2024 by advertising for a Deputy Principal. Already this year, we have expanded our leadership team to include "Leader of Learning in Numeracy" - (Charlotte Heinjus). Charlotte has hit the ground running and has already been extremely productive in this area.

As you can see, much has happened and there is much to look forward to in 2024.

CATASTROPHIC FIRE

Last year we had a day where Catastrophic Fire Conditions were declared. Whilst we hope that this does not happen, we need to inform you of the process.

COVID UPDATE

As you are probably aware, another strain of Covid is doing the rounds in our community at the moment.

In order to keep our school community safe, Catholic Education SA has updated their Covid Management Policy. It emphasises that all students, staff and site visitors who are exhibiting any Covid-19 symptoms should please stay away from school until acute symptoms (runny nose, sore throat, cough & fever) have cleared. Please be alert to symptoms and keep children home, even if they display only mild symptoms.

We also ask that families notify the school if your child returns a positive Covid-19 test. When we have five or more Covid-positive students in a class across a seven-day period, we will communicate with families of that class, requesting you be alert to possible symptoms.

The updated policy does refer to masks for students in Year 7-12 and all staff and visitors, should transmission rates of Covid reach certain outbreak thresholds. We will communicate this requirement to families IF this needs to be enacted. The plan also recognises that there may be instances where remote learning may become necessary in response to an outbreak. Clearly, we hope this won't happen, but we will work closely with families around this should the need arise.

BUSES

It has been really positive to see most of our ineligible bus students (ineligibility of students is a result of bypassing a government school), being able to access provisional eligibility on the bus routes within the first week of term. Sincere thanks to CHS for being able to process this in a very short time, and thankyou for the patience of those affected. A big thankyou to Tom, Sarah W and Nicola who spent a majority of the long weekend at school processing paperwork, driving to Adelaide to get extra buses and communicating with parents. I would also like to thank Tom, Chris & Gabrielle for driving the St Joseph's buses. We hope to hear positive news about the remaining 2 bus routes in the coming days.

STUDENT LEADERSHIP

ICE BLOCKS

In Terms 1 & 4 our students in Year 6 sell ice blocks at lunch time on Monday - Thursday. The Year 6 students need a week or so to sort out their roles and responsibilities and as a result will let us know when they are ready to commence. The cost for the ice blocks is .50c. We request that students only bring enough money to purchase one for themselves. We have found that if they have extra money it can place pressure on them. The Middle School is looking into this process currently.





Welcome back for 2024!

In line with Catholic Education SA's strategy of "Keeping Catholic Education Affordable", our fees for students in Reception - Year 9 have not increased - again - this year. Note: Fees for students in Middle School (Yrs 7 - 9) are approximately 10% higher than Primary students due to the increased costs of curriculum delivery associated with Middle School.

Fees are invoiced across the four terms of the year, providing families with the opportunity to budget accordingly. We request that payments are made by the end of Week 5 of each term.

We are happy to work with families on payment options for school fees. Many families elect to pay fortnightly instalments towards their fees. You can set this up with your own bank via BPAY, or we can set up a direct debit facility if you prefer. Information on School Card is also included with this newsletter for those who meet the eligibility criteria.

FROM THE APRIM WELLBEING

Welcome to the 2024 School Year. We are currently in the Liturgical Season of Ordinary Time, which is represented by the colour green. Ordinary time is by no means ordinary, it is a time of growing and to reflect on the wonder of creation. The Liturgical Year concludes at the beginning of Advent each year and rotates through a 3-year cycle of readings. We are currently in Year B, with readings focussing on the Gospel of Mark. The first sentence of Mark's gospel is: "The beginning of the good news of Jesus Christ, the Son of God." Each school year is a new beginning and as a faith community, we strive to live by the 'good news' of Jesus as we follow in his footsteps.

SACRAMENTAL PROGRAM: SEVENHILL PARISH

The Sacramental Program in the Sevenhill Parish is run both through St Joseph's School and through the Parish.

BAPTISM

Parents wishing to enrol their Child/Children for the Sacrament of Baptism contact Fr Kieran Gill, the Parish Priest and make a time to meet with him to discuss preparation for this sacrament.

If students are attending St Joseph's school, Helen Hay, the Assistant Principal, Religious Identity and Mission (APRIM)/ class teachers are happy to help organise the celebration of this sacrament in consultation with the Parish Priest and the student's family.

If the child is not of school age or does not attend St Joseph's School, the Parish Priest will prepare the student for the sacrament and liaise with the family in organising the celebration of this sacrament.

RECONCILIATION, FIRST EUCHARIST, CONFIRMATION

Enrolments for these sacraments are sought at the beginning of the year that the celebration of the sacrament takes place. Enrolments are sought via the school and parish newsletters.

Students attending St Joseph's School are prepared by classroom teachers during school religion lessons, with the support of the APRIM and the Parish Priest.

All children enrolled in a particular sacrament i.e. Reconciliation, celebrate the sacrament together as a group. Further information will be sent out to students in Year 3-6 as a separate note and a brief introduction and welcome will be held at the February Family Mass for those interested in finding out more about the Sacrament program. *God Bless*

WELLBEING

Benefits of a strong parent-school relationship

As a parent, you know your child better than anyone else does. Your child's teachers will want to get to know your child too.

When you have a strong and respectful relationship with your child's school and teachers, you're in a good position to give them information to help your child get the most out of education. You and your child's teachers can work together to support your child's learning and wellbeing.

When everybody is working together in the best interests of your child, your child is likely to reap academic and social benefits, like:

- · regular school attendance
- positive school results
- a positive attitude towards school
- · good social and relationship skills
- a sense of wellbeing
- school completion

You can help your child get the most out of school by communicating and building relationships with teachers, other parents and students from the very first day. This is better than having contact with your child's school only when there's a problem, either at school or in your family.

How to build a strong parent-school relationship

You can build a parent-school relationship in several ways:



- Say hello to teachers and other staff at school pick-up and drop-off times.
- Ask teachers for information or feedback about your child, and share your child's special events or achievements outside school.
- Spend time with your child completing homework a great opportunity to ask about their learning and their day. Information you can discuss with teachers.
- Go to parent-teacher interviews and parent meetings.
- Check the school website, noticeboard and emails regularly.
- Be involved and help out in the school community in whatever ways you can.
- Learn more about the school by looking at its annual report, website, newsletters and so on.
- Go to school performances, school barbecues, cultural or music events, school fairs and parent seminars.

Not all parents can be involved in school as much as they'd like, but you can still let your child know that school is important to your family. Talking about school with your child, being warm and friendly at school events, and being positive about the school and its staff sends the message that you value education and are interested in what's happening for your child at school.

Parent-teacher interviews

Parent-teacher interviews at primary school and parent-teacher interviews at secondary school are one of the main ways that many parents find out how their child's education



is going. Interviews can be a great way of getting all the important people – you, the teacher and your child – talking together.

It's important for the teacher and school to know about anything that's affecting your child's wellbeing. For example, your child might have a health condition, you might be concerned about bullying, or there might have been a change in your family, like a death, separation or divorce. Sharing of information is vital to ensure the best outcomes for your child. With open communication parents, teachers and students work together to ensure a successful and enjoyable year at school. We all want the best outcomes for students and with a shared vision and respectful relationships this can be achieved for your child.

PICKLED CUCUMBERS

Ingredients:

- 7 large green cucumbers
- 2 onions
- 5 cups white vinegar
- 5 cups white sugar
- 1 tbsp whole grain mustard
- 2 tsp ground turmeric
- 1 tsp salt(optional)
- ½ cup salt for salting

Method:

- 1. Slice cucumbers & onions thinly. Sprinkle with the ½ cup salt & stand overnight.
- 2. Next day drain off cucumber & onion. Discard the liquid. Give a quick rinse.
- 3. Mix together vinegar, sugar, turmeric & mustard.
- 4. Place drained cucumber & onions in a saucepan. Pour vinegar/sugar mixture over them & bring to boiling point. Gentle boil for about 5-6 minutes.
- 5. Sterilise jars & metal lids in the oven. 6. Bottle & seal while hot.

NB Salting overnight helps these cucumber pickles keep their crunch





ST JOSEPH'S PROUD ABORIGINAL AND TORRES STRAT ISLANDER (ATSI) STUDENTS

Welcome to any new families who have joined our school community. At St Joseph's School, Clare, we proudly state we are a culturally respectful community. This means we have achieved many significant actions within our school.

Firstly, we acknowledge our incredible school community is built upon Ngadjuri country. Our students know the importance of demonstrating respect to Ngadjuri peoples. We know the spirits of Elders passed continue to live on in the hills and rivers on Ngadjuri country. We know Ngadjuri people continue to teach culture and language and we are fortunate to have them work together with our students. We also know that the younger Ngadjuri generations are incredibly important to continue the thousands of years of history associated with the Clare Valley.

Finally, our Indigenous students come from far and wide. From the Torres Strait all the way down to Geelong is 'Country' or home for our students. They come from Wagadagam, Adynamanthya, Ngarrindjeri, Southern Arrente, Yankunytjatjara, Wadawurrung and Queensland. We greatly appreciate the culture, language and wisdom they share with us.

Our whole staff continue to be actively involved in developing their Indigenous cultural knowledge. I am incredibly proud in the way our staff use this knowledge to influence their teaching and learning opportunities within the classroom. All students will be guided by their teachers to develop their own Acknowledgement of Country for use at assemblies, line ups, etc.

Over the course of the year, our ATSI students will have many opportunities to learn more about their history, stories and culture. This is vital as it allows them to have the ability to place themselves in a post Voice referendum world. These students also take great pride in planning our three Indigenous focus events for the year.

- National Reconciliation Week
- NAIDOC Week
- Indigenous Literacy Day-The Great Book Swap

Our Indigenous students will also plan excursions that allow them to interact with a wider group of Indigenous children. At these events they dance, sing, cook, tell stories, listen to Elders, and most importantly, eat great tucker.

Our ATSI students have been developing a personal profile ready for display in the front office.

Our Reconciliation Action Plan (RAP) is directly influenced by the needs and desires of all our school community. Our school continues to work proactively towards meaningful Reconciliation. Our school believes this to be a very meaningful and relevant way to direct how we engage significantly with our local Ngadjuri people and promote Reconciliation within our school community. If you would like to more involved in our RAP as a community member, please feel free to contact the school.

HOW OUR PARENTS SUPPORT THE CANTEEN

There are two ways families are able to support the Canteen service:

Pay a \$25 levy each semester (added to School fees during the year). The levy helps to pay for infrastructure required to run the canteen whilst volunteers provide the labour.

The Canteen Committee acknowledges that parents are the primary educators of their children when it comes to making healthy food choices.

ORDERING

Canteen items can **ONLY** be ordered through the QKR App (you will find prices on there).

The app can be uploaded to your phone, iPad or home computer and provides the opportunity for you to place a canteen order for your child. In order to place a canteen order you will be required to follow the prompts to set up your child's profile. Cut-off time for canteen orders is 8am each Thursday morning. If you delete your order before this cut-off time you will not be charged. Orders cannot be deleted after the cut-off time, and as items will be delivered according to the orders placed, there will be no refunds.

WHEN YOUR CHILD IS SICK OR AWAY

Please notify the front office if your child is sick or away. If they have a canteen order, a sibling or parent may collect their food from the canteen.
