## FROM THE PRINCIPAL

#### **REPORTS**

As part of our ongoing assessment of student learning, the staff have been compiling Semester One Reports. These will be sent home late in Week 10. It has been a pleasure for me to read the reports noting the successes, the achievements, the improvements and also the goals and plans that have been formulated for further improvement. I would like to thank the staff for their diligence and attention to detail.

#### **PUPIL FREE DAYS**

Each year, St Joseph's School's staff are involved in 4 pupil free days. On these days, they gather to undertake whole school professional learning which otherwise they would not be able to participate in. Each week, our staff gather at a staff meeting and undertake a professional learning session as well as administrative tasks.

This year, we have requested an extra professional learning day as we are undertaking training to become a "Real School". Currently, approximately half of our teaching staff have taught as St Joseph's for less than 4 years. Whilst it is exciting that we gain enthusiastic and new ideas from new staff, it is also important that we maintain, and improve, the culture we have here. As a result, we are undertaking a three year journey to become a "Real School".

The additional pupil free day is scheduled for Wednesday 4 September, 2024 (Adelaide Show Week).

#### **REAL SCHOOLS**

St Joseph's School, Clare, has a proud history of implementing Restorative Justice practices in our response to resolving conflict, improving student behaviour and therefore, improving culture. However, we also recognise that today's students need something more from us, and that practices change over time.

Enter, Real Schools — a Restorative Justice program that assists staff and students to ask the right questions when things go wrong. Most approaches in the past have had us putting on our detective hats and focussing on what has happened (past). The new approach, Restorative Justice 2.0, is to work in the present towards a better future. Put simply, when things go awry, we will be asking your children questions like:

What happened?

How has that made people feel?

What action needs to be taken to make that better?

The process is about teaching responsibility for your actions and knowing that nobody else is going to do it for you. This will be a "whole school" implementation, from Reception to Year 9 and will result in a consistent approach across year levels, between staff, students, parents and community.

Our staff will be undertaking training with Real Schools in Term 3, and then implementing the program across the school. Our partnership with Real Schools is ongoing, with regular updates and support – and you, as parents, will have access to resources as well.

One of the most exciting aspects of Real Schools is that it provides parents with the tools to help them "parent". The program will provide information, examples and training on how to talk with your child/ren about different behaviours. Real Schools will run workshops, Q&As, and be available on line to answer your questions.

Please note for your calendars, that the whole staff training

day will take place on Wednesday 4 September (Adelaide Show week) and will be a pupil-free day for our students. This day also aligns with Clare High School's Show Day.

We are excited about the positive changes this program offers for our whole school community.

The past two weeks has been a very exciting time for our students. They have been involved in a diverse array of experiences. Every student has been able to engage in at least one co-curricular activity that has helped build their learning and personal development.

#### YEAR 7'S

Starting with the Year 7s, who have been working for a long time getting ready for both Pedal Prix and the Community Dinner. During our PE lessons this term, our students have been training for the pedal prix, both in the trikes and in the gym. They were ready. It was a dark cold morning when we arrived for scrutineering as myself and a few parents lined up to have our pedal cars looked at. This process went smoothly and with only a few minor modifications to make to the cars, we were ready to get racing.

Our involvement in the race at Victoria Park has been going on for approximately 20 years and our presence has grown to being one of the largest teams, with the most students present on the day. It is a beautiful atmosphere with many parents and students working together and having a good time. This race is a 6-hour event. Each team of 6 students must battle it out to try and complete the largest number of laps. Our Year 7s did a brilliant effort, overall completing a total of 627km.



The Year 7s then had to back it up with another huge week of preparations for the annual Community Dinner. Again, this is another long standing tradition our Year 7s have been involved in. This year, the group learnt how to make beautiful biscuits with stamped fondant icing. We had parent helpers, Mel, Laura and Alice coming in to assist with the process. That was just the start! The Year 7s had been learning some dances throughout the term as part of their pastoral care lessons which connected perfectly to relationships and feeling uncomfortable in unfamiliar settings. The Year 7s had mastered the moves to Grease Lightning, which was performed at the dinner in an immersive experience for the families who attended.

On the night, the students did an amazing job and undertook their responsibility with a great deal of maturity and professionalism. They were led by Mr Ackland and Miss Mooney, as well as a team of Year 7 parents. They were charged with being floor staff and learnt a great deal from the team at ASH catering about the industry.

This event concludes the impressive amount of work all Year 7 families undertake in raising funds for our annual Year 7 camp to Canberra. I mentioned on the night that the money raised is fantastic and we are very grateful for it however, the greatest outcome we see from this fundraising process is in

"out of the classroom" experiences we get to have with our students.

I have to extend a huge show of gratitude to the Year 7 students for their effort, their families and also the teaching staff for all playing their roles in making this experience for our students so rewarding and enjoyable.

#### **YEAR 8 & 9**

Moving onto the Year 8s and 9s, they have had many out of the classroom experiences over the past two weeks. The Year 8/9 Ag class has been on 3 field trips in the past two weeks having some hands-on experiences in viticulture and at Princess Royal Station. At each of the field trips our students engaged in industry based learning which helps to build their understanding of the greater world of agriculture and learn about the many different careers that are associated with the industry. The students also were able to do some hands-on learning in the vineyards in preparation for the South Australian Pruning Competition. Well done, to Kelley, George and Jack who won the inaugural school-based pruning championship held last week. A great achievement with only limited pruning experience, a great reward for a great effort. A huge thank you to Mr Grbin for attending the excursions and driving the bus. Also a huge thankyou to Rachel Trengove from the Clare Wine and Grape Association for hosting us on the day and starting this brilliant initiative.

The Year 8/9 energy tech students also attended their second Pedal Prix race for the year. Both teams had a slightly different make up of members due to illnesses and other sporting commitments however, the teams still went into the event feeling very confident. With their recent success at Tailem Bend, there had been a lot of conversations about tactics and race plans. Things came together extremely well. Our all-boys team consisting of Cody, Dane, Hudson, Jedd, Matt put in a blistering effort completing 162 laps in total (approximately 216km). These boys did an amazing job, and were in the mix for a podium finish all day however, in the dying laps of the race we were held up in the pits by a marshall due to a broken window which had been ripped from our car in a small collision, this put us in forth position. Matt was given the task to claw us back onto the podium, despite an amazing effort and recovering a 40 second gap, we missed out on third by just four seconds. They completed 140 laps which was over 20 laps more than their nearest competitor and Logan managed to complete the fastest lap by a mixed team. He received a flag and a medal for his achievements.

#### PRINCESS ROYAL FEEDLOT EXCURSION

On Friday June 14, the Year 8 & 9 Ag class visited Princess Royal Feedlot at Booborowie and were hosted by Bec Rowe. We were lucky enough to be able to drive around the feedlot and see the 3 sections that have been developed since 2008. We learnt that there were 18,000 cattle in the feedlot and they employ 90 people overall. There were lots of different breeds including Herefords, Red Angus and Murray Greys but the most popular were the Black Angus. There are approximately 1,000 cattle coming in and 1,000 cattle leaving the feedlot system weekly. They are sent to Wagga Wagga for processing into the highest level of market which is the EU (European Union) and which has strict criteria for the beef quality. Overall, it was a really interesting experience that everyone enjoyed learning about and we are grateful for the time Bec gave to our group. Thanks to Mr Ackland for driving the bus and Mrs Crawford for organising the excursion.

#### **SA PRUNING CHAMPIONSHIPS - FRIDAY JUNE 21**

The Year 8 & 9 Ag class were fortunate to attend the SA Pruning Championships hosted by Kilikanoon at Morrison's Vineyard, Leasingham on Friday June 21. We were able to see professional pruners compete in the individual Rod & Spur pruning and understand a different method of pruning than the spur pruning method that we had learnt. We were able to engage with Kelly and Mercedes who are both involved as vineyard managers and wine makers in our local area. They explained the static displays and introduced us to the company representatives after a great morning tea of hot chocolates and donuts. We learnt about the technology that has made vineyard work easier and more efficient, saving time, money and many hours of labour. We received a refresher in spur pruning from Troy Van Dulken to remind us of a few tips before we competed in the inaugural schools team spur competition. We formed into our teams of 3, with Ms Crawford having to help out one group as a competitor. It was a nervous experience with the judges being so close and they were great at helping coach us and providing feedback to help us improve. At the completion of judging the Green Machine (Kelley, George, Jack) were awarded first place, with their time being a deciding factor and room for improvement on their technique. The Red Machine (Bryce, Ben, Meredith Crawford) were awarded fourth place. All students were commended on their efforts and their willingness to engage with the concept of a schools competition.

We would like to thank Rachel Trengove and the organising committee from the Clare Valley Wine and Grape Growers Association for their organisation and development of the school competition. We certainly look forward to participating again in the future. It was a great format to see what is happening in our local viticulture industry and understand the methods of pruning that are currently occurring in vineyards.


#### COMMUNION



Please continue to record books your child is reading for the Premier's Reading Challenge that runs from March until September. The Premier's Reading Challenge is designed to encourage students to read a variety of books to deepen their love of reading. It's a great opportunity to try different styles of books or find a new favourite author.

#### What do we need to do?

Your child will have a PRC form to complete – they need to read and record 12 books they have read by September 6, 2024. That is 10 weeks away!

Students in Reception to Year 6 must read 8 "sticker books" and 4 free choice books, while Year 6-9 students read 4 "sticker books" and 8 free choice books. We have plenty of "sticker books" in the library, as do our public libraries, or you can check the PRC website to find recommended sticker books

(<a href="https://premiersreadingchallenge.sa.edu.au/book-list/">https://premiersreadingchallenge.sa.edu.au/book-list/</a>). A "sticker book" is a PRC recommended book for a particular age group.



#### How do we know what books to read?

You can use the handy PRC stickers to identify suitable books:

- Reception to Year 2 (red)
- Year 3 -5 (green)
- Year 6-9 (yellow)

## WELLBEING

#### What can you do about bullying?

#### Face to face

- Stay calm. Try focusing on your breathing as a way to stay calm. Staying calm and not showing that you are overwhelmed can help you to feel better.
- Don't fight back, as this can make the situation worse, get yourself hurt or blamed for starting the trouble.
- Try to ignore the bullying by calmly turning and walking away. If the person doing the bullying tries to stop or block you, try to be firm and clear. Having friends to stand with you or walk you away is a great idea in these moments.
- Try to avoid the person who is bullying you or ask a friend to stay with you when they're around.
- Tell a trusted adult what has happened straight away. They can support you and help you find ways to get the bullying to stop.
- Get some more information. Schools, universities, TAFEs and workplaces have anti-bullying policies that can help you to find out what you can do.

#### Cyberbullying

- Report any bullying to the site where it is occurring. All social media platforms have a reporting system. It's anonymous, straightforward and depending on what you've reported, there's a chance it could get taken down quickly.
- Keep everything that is sent to you with screenshots, whether they're nasty comments, pictures or messages
   try to get a permanent copy of it.
   This is so you can show these to someone you trust later on.
- Contact the eSafety Commissioner, if after 48 hours the image or content has not been removed by the site, or if you're feeling afraid or threatened.
- Talk to people you trust. Let them know how you're feeling and that you need their support.
- Ask your friends to stand up for you by challenging the bullying in low-risk ways.
- Talk to your parents, carer, teacher or another trusted adult about what's happening. When families and schools work together, this is the best way to address it
- Block the person or people from being able to contact you and change your privacy settings to protect what you post on social media.
- Delete your current online account and start a new one if the bullying is persistent and ongoing. Only give your new details to trusted friends.

Remember, it's unlikely that everyone agrees with the person bullying, even if they don't say something to support you. They might be afraid of getting involved or could be ignoring the person bullying as a way of not joining in. It's important that everyone feels comfortable standing up for one another in ways that won't but them at risk.

# What is a bystander?

Someone who sees or knows about the bullying is called a bystander. It can feel difficult to step in, but a bystander can have a big effect on whether the bullying continues or not. It can also help someone who has been targeted see they have people who support them.

# What can I do if I'm a bystander?

Try not to support the bullying by looking on and doing nothing, laughing at the person being bullied or by 'liking' or sharing hurtful photos or posts online.

If you feel safe, step in and speak up in an assertive but not an aggressive way. Show the person that you're there for them by spending time chatting with them and helping them to walk away from the situation. Remind the person being bullied there is always help available.

It's important to think carefully about your safety before you try to stop the bullying. If you can't safely take action yourself, report it to a trusted adult and let them know you want to remain anonymous.

## Getting support

If you're being bullied, it's a good idea to build your supports and know you're not alone. Building a support network of family, friends, Elders, staff from school or work and/or mental health professionals is important to getting support and putting a stop to bullying as quickly as possible.



- Birdseed Mix


#### **HOW TO MAKE**


- 1. Tie a length of string to the top of the pine cone , creating a loop you can hang your feeder by.

- 4. Hang the feeder by the string in a tree, bush, or another place outdoors.


