


YEAR 9 CAMP










My highlight of our recent camp was the nights around the fire and playing games before bed. We shared stories around the fire and got along during games.

The outdoor education students have been practicing their orienteering skills. I have enjoyed seeing them persist with learning a new and difficult skill.



ROYAL ADELAIDE SHOW - SCIENCE INVESTIGATION AWARDS

The Year 8 & 9 Ag class attended the Science Investigation awards held on Monday 2nd September at the Royal Adelaide Show. Students worked in pairs or individually to plan, design and conduct investigations of their own choice over the past 5 weeks. They had to then write a science report and construct a poster to meet the awards criteria. Whilst at the Show they had to present their science poster to 2 separate industry judges, discussing their findings and research. It was a great opportunity to share their science inquiry skills and get feedback from scientists and people who work in the agricultural industry. It was a great opportunity to see the science posters from the 100 student finalists throughout the state from Years 4-9 and we are grateful to Belinda Cay (AgCommunicators) and the RAHS for their continued support of these awards. We are looking forward to preparing our entries for next year, already thinking of how we can improve our science communication, topics that we would like to investigate and gaining some valuable experiences in our learning.

Congratulations to Will Mitchell and Will Nicholls who were awarded third place in the Year 8 Category for their research about vegeburgers and beef burgers — can consumers tell the difference?

WELLBEING

DADS

So how should fathers go about building connectedness with their daughters? These ten tips were put together with the help of several fathers of girls, and I thank them. These fathers aren't perfect. but kids don't need perfect dads. They need 'good-enough dads', just like they need 'good-enough mums'.



10 TIPS FOR BUILDING **FATHER-DAUGHTER RELATIONSHIPS**

1. Tell your daughter every day that she is loved

Tell your daughter every day that she is loved, smart, beautiful, worthy, capable and all those things that you know her to be. She should feel your love, respect, and belief in her all the way to her core.

If you don't tell her she is loved, capable, and worthy, you leave her vulnerable to inauthentic people who will win her over with words. When someone in her future flatters her, she should think, 'Yes. I know that, my dad told me. Now, what else have you got besides compliments?'

2. Ensure your daughter knows she can talk to you and you will love her no matter what she tells you

You need to be a safe space for your daughter. That will mean turning off your ego. It isn't about you listening to find a solution, it is about listening to understand. Breathe, be still and focus on what she is saying verbally and with her body language. You will soon see what it means to her that you listen without judgement.

3. When you make mistakes, don't be afraid of starting

When you make mistakes, don't be afraid of starting again. Take the hit to your pride, apologise and start again. You don't become a better parent by beating yourself up for getting things wrong, you become a better parent by learning from your mistakes. It's also important to realise you only really



know if you're making mistakes by inviting feedback. Honest feedback can be confronting, but it's important.

4. Be involved in your daughter's education

Talk regularly with your daughter about school and her assigned work, and get involved! Discuss issues presented at school. Check homework. Read with her, go to the library with her. Discuss her dreams for her future, without imposing your own.

5. Know that time always matters.

People talk about quality time over quantity of time. What even is quality time? When your daughter looks back on her life with you, she is going to remember whether or not you were there. She will remember you being around.

6. Provide a stable base for her to launch from

As girls become teenagers they strive for and explore independence. At this time, they can often push away from their parents and that can really hurt. Don't take it personally, don't react with anger, it will only drive them further away. Communicate boundaries effectively but support her in her development and be there as a stable base when she needs you.

7. Do the school drop-off whenever you can

The school drop-off will keep you connected and in the know. A quick stop for hot chocolate or chips on the way home will only cost you \$4 but it is one of the best investments you'll ever make.

8. In times of conflict...pause

Got a problem? Pause. Rather than trying to control or fix things, it is much more effective to stop and first look at the issue being discussed. Is it even important? A pause will help you find the guidance and learning in the situation, for your daughter and for yourself. You can then act instead of reacting.

9. Build traditions and rituals

Traditions and rituals create bonds and keep you connected even in difficult times. They don't have to be fancy traditions. They can be having a photo in the same place at the same time every year. It might be reading part of a favourite book together every night, a funny handshake or a monthly date night. In times of stress and upset, these familiar spaces will be a place where you can reconnect.

10. Be prepared to make a fool of yourself in front of your daughter.

Daggy dancing, singing out of key, having a go at activities you have no mastery over are all fun and important in your daughter's formation and in your relationship. Not only will you laugh together, and laughter is bonding, but she will learn that 'looking good' all the time simply isn't a priority, having fun and experimenting is.



FINAL THOUGHT...

No family situation is the same and very few are perfect, and that's okay. Kids know when you love them and are doing the best you can, and that counts for more than anything.



VOCABULARY - SOMETHING WE CAN ALWAYS

LEARN

Vocabulary the knowledge of words is highly correlated with reading fluency and understanding (Scarborough 2001). so the more words you know, the better you understand what you are reading. Vocabulary is an important focus of literacy teaching and refers to the knowledge or words,



including their structure (morphology), use (grammar), meanings (semantics), and links to other words (word/semantic relationships).

This excerpt from The Department of Education and Training, Victoria, explains why we need to teach vocabulary.

Oral vocabulary refers to words that children can understand or use while speaking and listening. Oral vocabulary is closely related to reading vocabulary, which is the words that children can recognise and use in their reading or writing. Children need to have a rich vocabulary that continually grows through language and literacy experiences, to comprehend and construct increasingly complex texts, and engage in oral language for a variety of social purposes.

Most of our everyday language uses simple vocabulary. But when we are learning new concepts in Science, Humanities, Technologies and other subjects, we need to understand more complex vocabulary; most of which have Latin and Greek origins. By learning the meaning of Latin or Greek root words, prefixes or suffixes, you can better understand, and more easily remember, all the vocabulary words built on these elements that exist in English words.

So, how can I help my child?

When you are reading together, discuss new or unknown words, their meaning and origin. And discuss various meanings of the same word – understanding the "depth" of words is important too (think of words like park, novel or interest that can have different meanings, depending on how they are used).

If a teacher sends home some vocabulary words for a particular topic that students will be learning about, spend some time learning about the meanings with them. Discuss the meaning, other words that may have the same origins, and how you might use the words in a sentence.

You will need:

- ¼ cup of mixed seeds
- I cup of soil
- 2 cups of air-drying clay
- ½ cup of water (may need more or less depending on consistency)

Method:

- I. Mix the soil, clay, and seeds with a little over half of the water to make a dough, kneading it gently until smooth. You should end up with a texture like modelling clay or Plasticine. Add more water a little at a time if the mixture is too stiff or doesn't come together.
- Shape the dough into balls, using a little extra water if the mixture is too flaky. Moistening your hands a little can help the balls to form evenly, but avoid making the dough too wet and mushy.
- 3. Place the shaped balls on the brown paper for a day or two to dry out.
