

#### YEARBOOK 2024





#### **CHICKENS - HYLINE BROWN**


#### Available Term 1, Week 1 - 2025

On Monday and Tuesday of Week 8, the Year 9s got the opportunity to carve and create boomerangs with Uncle Ian. We were all given a variety of curved sticks to choose from. Then we were taught about his business where he makes and sells his boomerangs. We then started to carve the bark off and start to shape the wood. We used hatchets to get the bark off and create the basic shape, we then used metal files to create a smoother finish. Once we were approved on our shape and texture, Ian used a belt sander to finish the smooth edges and final shape. Once all the sanding was done, we oiled each of our boomerangs and set them out to dry. It was a really fun time and everyone enjoyed learning and applying our knowledge.

"Learning how to craft an ornamental boomerang from a freshly harvested piece of mulga was a wonderful way to wrap up our term of Indigenous Culture and Languages. Ian Harradine from Wurrtoo Cultural Services spent two days with our graduating Year 9 class, displaying his exceptional woodcarving skills and obvious passion for his craft. He showed us how to mould a piece of wood into a beautiful, ceremonial ornament that will endure for well over one hundred years. Each student now has a boomerang to keep as a memento of their final year, and as a reminder that they are always, welcome to return one day, as former alumni of St Josephs School."




# GIVING TREE: MOORE STREET CENTRE FOR THE HOMELESS

O God, your will is justice for the poor and peace for the afflicted. May the birth of Christ bring healing to our hearts and fill us with joy and hope.



## WELLBEING

There's no denying that day-to-day life can be stressful. The pressure of work deadlines, piles of laundry, mowing lawns and getting the kids to school, sports training and play dates can mean there's not a lot of quality time left for family.

Going away on a holiday provides a great opportunity to recalibrate. But how do you ensure that you make the most of this precious time you have together?

#### 1. Involve children from the beginning



Getting children involved from the planning stage is a great place to start. "The process starts from the moment you start to fantasise and visualise the holiday, making it inclusive is a great way to make them feel engaged and build excitement."

Obviously, you can't just do everything they want to do on the trip, so it's important to find a balance. "You will find that kids will be more willing to do stuff that you want to do if it's a reciprocal relationship. Remember too, what they care about is time with you."

### 2. Be playful and embrace your inner child

Once you are there, it's important to stop, let go and enjoy yourself. "Let go for a little bit, be a bit more playful. Embracing your inner child is important."

"We learn about each other and about ourselves through play. Being on holidays is about connecting in the here and now and not focusing on outcomes and achievements. Get out of your routine. Allow the kids to see your fun side."

#### 3. Share your childhood holiday stories

Another way to connect is by sharing stories about when you went on similar holidays when you were a child – whether it's a camping trip, beach break or snow holiday.

"I'm big on building rituals like sitting around the fire or reflecting on something that you were really grateful for or something that you loved a."

#### 4. Put down the device

And, of course, it's important to minimise time on phones and video games to connect in person. "We need to have the integrity to hold ourselves accountable, because we can't really expect our kids to have that integrity if we aren't

prepared to show it. You can be realistic and say if everyone in their family has their devices with them let's only use them during certain times." And don't worry if the holiday isn't perfect – focus on the fact that you are together.



# WELLBEING INCLUSIVE EDUCATION

#### 5. Create positive memories through play

Playing board games and making sandcastles are amongst the greatest holiday memories for Australians. 70 per cent of Australians believe that playing with kids helps to create stronger bonds and memories.



Psychologist and parenting expert Michael Carr-Gregg says finding time and places to engage in play on holidays helps create positive memories and early brain development and bonds families together. "Nothing lights up the human brain like three-dimensional play with loved ones," he says. "Not only does play relieve stress, improve brain function and enhance creativity but it also improves our relationships and our connections to other people. Play is what helps us feel young and energetic throughout our entire lifespan."

#### 6. Make holidays fun for the whole family

"What family members want to do on a holiday can vary," clinical psychologist Jaimie Bloch says. "For example, one of the kids' values might be adventure, or it could be relaxation or bonding." She says it's important to think of ways each family member can fill their cup.

#### 7. One-on-one time is important

Families may feel like they need to do everything together on a holiday, but just like in everyday life they can split up and do different things, coming back together at mealtimes. "We know that kids really value one on one time when they're not having to compete with a mobile, smart device or another child," Bloch says.

"It can just be a small thing. Fifteen or 20 minutes is often long enough. It's good for their self-esteem and feeling more connected and bonded to a parent. The more you do things like that, the greater the connection you will have. When they feel connected and heard they're going to be more likely to follow through on instructions and be more manageable," she says.

These days, there's a lot of focus on material things – gifts, decorations, food, the best holiday spots, the best photo shots... Trying to make everything just perfect brings a lot of stress and for what? Focus on balance and make it as fun as possible. Allow the little squabbles and fights that always happens when children are around and give up the idea of perfect holidays. Perfection is overrated and years from now, you will only remember the beautiful little things that brought you joy – the fun you had shopping, the joy of baking cookies together, their smile when they opened their gifts... There's beauty in the little things and looking back, you won't remember the small annoyances that needlessly drove you crazy. And what will the kids remember???????? Those small moments too and the memories of special times shared.

#### How to encourage your kids to keep reading over summer?

If your child is just starting on their reading journey it's important they still practice decoding words and thinking about all the sounds that letters represent when they look at words. And of course, holidays are a great opportunity to read together and instil a love of books through imaginary worlds, information and learning about the world we live in

If your child is reading independently and can decode most words by themselves, it's still important to practice reading over the long holiday break. Discussing the who, what, where, when, why and how of a story your child is reading is a great way to find out how much they are understanding of their book. Vocabulary is important to expand when students are reading independently, so don't be afraid to get out the dictionary and check out what a word means and where it comes from. Reading together is still a great way to increase comprehension by spending time discussing your favourite characters, the plot, predictions, and why a character behaved the way they did. All these incidental conversations can build background knowledge and help your child to connect with their reading more deeply.

#### What about writing?

Practice writing skills by writing shopping lists, thank you cards after Christmas, or a letter to a relative/friend a long way away. Keep a journal of holiday activities, or get the whole family involved in writing and performing a play!

## What about their numeracy skills?

Spend time playing games that involve numbers – Yahtzee, Monopoly or car cricket are a few examples. You can also utilise those recently developed number skills by getting your child to help with shopping, cooking, counting sheep, working out fuel consumption or petrol prices, or any other activity where you use your maths skills.

A great way to reinforce the importance of literacy and numeracy skills is for your child to see you using them. Do some "thinking aloud" so your child can see how you solve problems and understand the processes involved. And showing your child that you use these skills in your everyday life rather than saying, "I was never good at Maths/English", is a powerful way to improve their attitude to learning in these areas.

# ZUCCHINI SLICE

## INGREDIENTS

5 Free Range Eggs

150g (1 cup) White Self Raising Flour, sifted

375g zucchini, grated

1 large onion, finely chopped 200g rindless bacon, chopped

1 cup grated cheddar cheese

60ml (1/4 cup) vegetable oil (or melted butter)

## METHOD

Step 1

Preheat oven to 170C.

Step 2

Beat the eggs in a large bowl until combined. Add the flour and beat until smooth, then add zucchini, onion, bacon, cheese and oil and stir to combine.

Step 3

Grease and line a 30 x 20cm lamington pan. Pour into the prepared pan and bake in oven for 30 minutes or until cooked through.
